Defining Criteria for Each of the Component

Three key areas are regularly identified when discussing a need for a new curriculum for students: daily living skills, self-determination and emotional learning. For the purpose of this proposal, those items have been named and defined as **functional skills**, **self-determination** and **social-emotional learning**. Using common definitions and language offers clarity and continuity for review of curriculum components for student learning needs.

Functional Skills: Skills students need to live and function independently as members of the community. Functional skills may look differently for various student needs, therefore they are broken down into each of these domains:

- **Daily Living/Life Skills:** self-toileting, self-feeding, making simple requests, dressing
- **Functional Academic:**
 - Math: Telling time, using money, counting, personal finances
 - Literacy: Signs, reading directions, recognizing symbols
- **Community-Based Skills:** Public transportation, crossing intersections, shopping
- **Social Skills:** Interactions with community members, peers, and teachers

Self-Determination: As students grow and learn, they build abilities to function as adults. Self-determination skills can help support students with transitioning to independence of adulthood.

- Self-determination can include:
 - Choice Making
 - Decision Making

- Problem Solving
- Goal Setting and Attainment
- Self-Advocacy and Leadership
- Self-Management and Self-Regulation
- Self-Awareness and Self-Knowledge
- Research has said self-determination in a school setting may include:
 - Students being more academically successful and engaged in schoolwork
 - Students contributing actively to their educational and transition planning
 - Students experiencing more post secondary involvement
 - Students reporting higher quality of life and more positive experiences in early adulthood

Social-Emotional Learning: According to CASEL, “Social and emotional learning (SEL) is the process through which children and adults understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions.”

There are five core topics:

- Self Awareness
- Self Management
- Responsible Decision Making
- Relationship Skills
- Social Awareness

Comparative Research

Below are six Social-Emotional Learning curricula initially researched for middle and high school whole school or small group implementation. The left side of each table provides a description of the program and curriculum options, as well as any relevant details on program availability or implementation. The right side of the table indicates the focal areas, as defined above, that are addressed within each curriculum, as well as targeted additional resources that are available within the curriculum options. Use of asterisks indicate that some options for the resource are available, with more information provided in the rationale.

<p>Explanation</p> <p>Brainwise appears to have wide use with education and social service organizations. The official website provides limited information about the specific content available in the modules/lessons; however, web searches provide access to articles and blogs that describe the “10 Wise Ways” outlined in the program. This program appears to address self-regulation and social-emotional learning topics, as well as incorporate some aspects of functional skills. Mention of programmatic elements within social services or counseling settings indicate materials may include problem solving and decision making worksheets that could contain aspects of functional skill development. The program is available in Spanish, offers family communication and support materials, and provides consideration for integration in a variety of inclusive settings. More information is needed on the tools available for functional skill development and data tracking resources, though some are mentioned on the website and within curriculum descriptions.</p>

iControl		
Description	Focal Areas Addressed	
<p>I Control is a full year tertiary intervention designed to teach three self-regulation skills: Goal Setting, Emotion Control, and Problem Solving. Consisting of 47 lessons to be taught sequentially, I Control includes graphic organizers, visual supports, and a variety of hands-on activities. The goal of I Control is to foster self-regulation and improve social/emotional outcomes for middle school students with emotional & behavioral disorders (EBD).</p> <p>Currently in development as part of a grant funded research project. Must be a participating school/teacher to access materials and create logins for students on the Brain Lab online platform. Can contact the Research Group to inquire about joining the project.</p> <p>I Control taps Executive Functioning (EF) skills such as inhibition of impulses, initiating, planning, strategy switching, and maintaining information in working memory. Explanation		
iControl curriculum is a targeted option for middle school students only. It is currently in development, therefore use and involvement is only afforded to select participants. It appears to focus on self-regulation and students with emotional behavioral disabilities and offers curriculum and strategies for executive functioning skill training. The online platform is currently password protected, therefore the available contents and resources are little known beyond the brief descriptions available on the resources linked below.

<p>Social Thinking is a methodology comprising several frameworks, concepts, strategies, tools, curricula, and lessons that should be assessed based on the students. The curriculum is organized by age range - 4-7 years old; 8-10 years old; 11-13 years old; 14-18 years old; Young Adult; and Adult. On the website there are a variety of articles for parents/families and webinars to access.</p>

The Zones of Regulation		
Description	Focal Areas Addressed	
<p><i>The Zones of Regulation</i>® is a framework and easy-to-use curriculum for teaching students strategies for emotional and sensory self-management.</p> <p>Rooted in cognitive behavioral therapy, The Zones approach uses four colors to help students identify how they are feeling in the moment given their emotions and level of alertness as well as guide them to strategies to support regulation. By understanding how to notice their body's signals, detect triggers, read social context and consider how their behavior impacts those around them, students learn improved emotional control, sensory regulation, self-awareness, and problem-solving abilities. Learning activities and visual supports are included on a USB for easy printing.</p> <p>Intended for use with ages 4 - adults. Lessons include adaptations for different age groups, but some lessons can feel childish for older students. Supplemental board game and card deck materials were developed with the intention of creating differentiated resources for 12-18 year olds and adults.</p>		Functional Skills

Explanation

The Zones of Regulation curriculum is widely used as a social emotional learning curriculum for whole class, small group and 1:1 instruction. It does not appear to have specific resources for English Language Learners, online learning platform options or centralized data tracking resources; however, limited data assessment tools are available online for free download and use, and several apps have been developed for individual student use at home or at school. Zones has parent communication forms in three languages and the fidelity checklist provides guidance for use in general education and special education settings. While this program does not have some of the functionalities of multiple grade level kits or curriculum options, supplemental resources available for purchase can extend use and learning with game play, materials are relatively low cost, and the curriculum can be paired with a variety of other materials offered by SocialThinking for extension of practice and instruction.
